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Isaiah 41:31 says "they that wait upon the lord will renew their strength . In our waiting we have plenty of time to meditate and contemplate. That does not mean we do nothing. Worship, contemplation, and meditation are all work, but they are also waiting, waiting for the Lord. Do you feel you have waited? Do you feel you are renewed? Perhaps some of you more than others but I see so many signs that we are ready to go. Now that we have renewed our strength, we can as Isaiah says sore as Eagles, run tirelessly, and walk constantly with the Lord our God. The Disciple Men's Group is in the midst of planning a supper. Outreach is looking ahead and organizing projects. Worship is orchestrating Holy Week and beyond services. Property has continued during remote services to improved parts of the building. And I know others of you are thinking of ideas for your congregation. a

blessing for me, as your Pastor, to be a witness to your service and excitement as we walk with excitement and run with joy.


Heavenly Sounds will be playing this month with their rendition of "Were You There". We practice with masks on and do our best to stay safe. We hope you are doing the same!
