The outreach of this congregation has made an impression as this month we will ship several boxes for the Shoebox Ministry. We have spent about six months putting together items. You can see the beauty of these gifts and, as

Wanda has reminded us, with these the gospel will touch an average of seven people per shoebox. Even though it seems simple to us, it's an extravagant gift for the children and even their parents that receive them.

Locally, the Mary and Martha Group has given to the Fred Wild Elementary School grade 5 clothes and school supplies so that children who have little will have less to worry about during their school year and during winter. We have, what I consider, a very good balance between reaching out locally and reaching out across the state and the world.

We ask your help to replenish the pastor's discretionary fund with an offering. The fund began with \$500 to help non-members with some needed utility bills, gas, transportation, and other family and personal expenses. We would ask that the first Sunday of every month you would support the fund with just a few dollars. An opportunity to help will be by donations that will be received at the back of the sanctuary. This is how we make a difference in the community and how we make a difference as a congregation.

Food For Thought

Present Tense


After "turkey day" came and went last year, a pastor challenged church members to ask one another not "How was your Thanksgiving?", but "How is your Thanksgiving?". After all, giving thanks should be an ongoing act.

That doesn't always need to be profoundly deep, either. A.J. Jacobs, author of <u>Thanks A Thousand</u>, once asked a philosophy professor friend what he was grateful for. The shockingly simple reply? "Sometimes I'm just grateful I have arms." That odd but spot-on answer shows the importance, Jacobs says, of being "thankful for things so omnipresent that they escape notice."

So....how is your Thanksgiving?

Kansas pastor Jack Wellman has been credited with the insight that "there is a certain genius in generosity." He explains that when we open our hands – figuratively speaking - to allow something to pass through our fingers, rather than holding it tightly clenched in our fists, God can give us new blessings.

"God cannot pour more into our hands that are already clinging tightly to what they hold," says Wellman. Whether material goods or time, ideas or talents, money or energy, the gifts God has given us so generously are to be shared just as freely with others. With our hands continually open to receive, give and receive again, Gods' genius cycle of generosity goes on and on.



"GOD IS NIGH"

The earliest official reference to using "Taps" at a military funeral is described in an 1891 manual. During the Civil War, a Union soldier "was buried at a time when the battery occupied an advanced position concealed in the woods." Because it wasn't safe to fire the customary three volleys over the grave, Captain John Tidball decided the sounding of "Taps" would be an appropriate substitute ceremony.

Previously, "Taps" signaled the end of a soldiers' workday, but it has since come to honor the end of his or her earthly life. Horace Trims' lyrics remind us of Gods' constant presence.

Day is done, gone the sun,
From the lakes, from the hills, from the sky.
All is well, safely rest,
God is nigh.
Thanks and praise for our days
'Neath the sun, 'neath the stars, 'neath the sky.
As we go, this we know,
God is nigh.
