The final three in this series are:


- 7. **People keep believing in their ministry, even with small numbers.** Small numbers never mean small ministry. What excites me is that we do things (maybe small), in a big way! We include large numbers of people with the Friday evening fundraisers, fellowship dinners and other community activities. This is true in our prayer ministry where we pray every Sunday and every Wednesday and throughout the week for people that are our family, friends, and neighbors. Even though we have small numbers, we have a big ministry.
- 8. People are in touch with one another's spirit and the Holy Spirit! We are aware of one another, the attitude, outlook, demeanor, and perhaps a few other things we can't define. We are considerate and respectful and treat one another like we would like to be treated. Not only that, we are aware that the Holy Spirit is working within and between us and the spirit of God is always in our midst.
- 9. **Small churches aren't afraid to break the rules.** I am not sure if we know all of the rules or if we know which ones we are breaking. As a small congregation, we tend to look at issues pragmatically but able to see the spirit of the law and do that which is good and right and just.

As I initially read over these nine reasons, I could indeed affirm that we are thriving, maybe not doing all of them as good as we should, but doing every one and that has fostered our mission and our ministry to fulfill that great commission to go make disciples of all peoples, baptizing them in the name of the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. 

OUTREACH
