FROM THE PASTOR

Last month I shared three reasons out of nine why small churches thrive. Those three reasons are 1. Small churches are particularly authentic. 2. Small churches stay connected. 3. There is always time for prayers of the people. In our congregation, we see those three as central to who we are. The next three is where our congregation excels.

Reason four why small churches thrive is that people can build genuine loving relationships. I have been in very few congregations that can do that effectively but it seems to come very naturally for the First Christian Church Congregation of Sebring. We build relationships that last for years and even though we sometimes disagree with one another, it does not stop us from loving one another. We have a history with one another, yet we come together in worship and it is authentic and true worship. Even though at times our relationship may be strange and strained, it is still a genuine love and loving relationship.

Number five is one of the strongest points of our congregation. It is that the lay leaders are active and ready to help out. When I suggest sometimes it is often seemingly done before I ask it. We have the office Angels, some are paid but still do much volunteer work, as well as other volunteers.

ALL are very talented. As a matter of fact, the Clift's, who are relatively new, made the statement at lunch saying, "this congregation has a lot of talent". That talent is evident in the fellowships, outreach, worship, missions and property upkeep. We have strong leadership in so many areas of the church including group meetings, lunches, suppers, dinner, and movies. Lay leaders are active and ready to minister and is the primary key why we, as a small church, continue to thrive.

Number six is small churches wholeheartedly welcome visitors and guests, introducing themselves and saying hello at the beginning of the service. Large churches cannot do that. They simply can't because they are too big to be individualized. Small churches can be individualized with a simple "hello". People want to be loved. In our country where individualism is most valued, people want to belong to a group that is accepting of them and their gifts. Those gifts can make a bigger impact in a small church.

Let us continue in fostering loving and caring relationships, being and building active and ready lay leaders, and giving an open and warm welcome to those that come.

BTW (By the way) not related to DOC men:

Some of you may have noticed the statue in the office patio of the young boy riding a fish. The statue appeared suddenly, donated anonymously. At first it seemed like an odd thing to put on display in our church garden, but actually there is a great deal of theological significance in it. To begin with, the ancient symbol of Christianity was the fish. ICTHUS. During the early days of persecution the sign of the fish was a secret message by which the followers of Jesus identified themselves to each other.

You will notice that the fish has a gold coin in it's mouth. In Matthew 17:27 Tax collectors put Peter on the spot and asked if Jesus paid taxes. Peter responded, "Of course he does"....Later when the subject came up, Jesus asked Peter, "When it comes time to pay taxes to the king, who pays...the children or the subjects? Of course the answer was that the children of the King were free, they didn't have to pay taxes, but subjects were required to pay. In keeping with his teachings about not being concerned about what to eat and what to wear, believing that God would provide, Jesus tells Peter to go fishing, " pull in the first fish that bites. Open it's mouth and you will find a coin. Take it and give it to the tax men. It will be enough for both of us"

On another occasion when the question of paying taxes came up Jesus asked to see a coin..."Who's image is on the coin?" "Cesar" they replied, "Then give to Cesar what belongs to Cesar and give to God what belongs to God"

And what of the cherub sitting astride the fish? Could this perhaps be a symbol of Christ himself, in charge of the church?
